Major breakthroughs for the DSM

The rising tide of workers struggle throughout last year has had its reflection in the growth of the Democratic Socialist Movement. Searching for an alternative and won over by the bold vision of democratic socialism put forward by DSM many workers have taken their place in our ranks.

We have been inundated with requests for membership. Our membership has quadrupled in the space of one year. We now have branches (in some cases several) in all of the key mining areas of Rustenburg, Limpopo and Carletonville. Our members are active in seven provinces and within a matter of months we expect to be a fully national movement.

Our role in bringing together the miners national strike committee has cemented our relationship with this most

militant layer of the class. Dozens of strike leaders have joined our ranks. These workers bring their own experiences and ideas, which, when pooled with the DSM's existing history forms a formidable force.

The thirst for ideas, as workers have sought to politically educate themselves in the course of struggle, has seen thousands of copies of our newspaper, Izwi labasebenzi, sold. Such has been its success that we are taking immediate steps to move to more regular production and an increased print-run.

In early February DSM will hold its national conference. The conference, made up of elected rank-and-file members from our branches, old and new. will debate and discuss our political perspectives, DSM's role in developing the new WASP, elect a new national leadership, and debate ambitious party building targets. DSM has stood against the tide through the eighteen years of 'democratic' rule. We have defended the necessity of the political independence of the working class. We have maintained our confidence in a future society based on satisfying the needs and aspirations of the majority and not the greed for profit of a tiny minority – a socialist society. And we have remained steadfast in our internationalism as members of the Committee for a Workers International (CWI) – a world party of revolutionary socialism organised in over forty countries. Funding the revolutionary party

27th April 1994 was an historic day. For the first time in SA history, the black majority, armed with the right to vote, was able to oust the apartheid regime. On the ruins of the white minority regime a new government was elevated into office by the will of the black majority.

19 years later, the same socioeconomic problems that fuelled the struggle - poverty, mass unemployment, illiteracy and poor access to decent education, a sick health system, homelessness – remain unresolved. The parties in parliament compete against each other

like celebrity chefs – different cook same meal: capitalism. The working class may have the right to vote, but we are disenfranchised.

That the ANC is the party of the bosses has never been as clear as after the Marikana massacre – it is he party of the capitalist class. That not a single party in parliament condemned the massacre is the clearest evidence that as the working class, we are on our own.

Realising that it is consistently losing support amongst the masses, the ANC is now proposing to increase state funding for political parties whilst continuing to oppose

disclosure of party donors. What are they hiding? The fact that they are funded by big business to implement the capitalist policies that are ruining the lives of working class peoples. He who puts money into the disco machine decides which song must be played.

The DSM is a party funded by working class people. It will oppose increased state party funding. It will be a party funded by the rands and cents of ordinary working class people. Millionaires are pouring millions into the ANC and other capitalist parties. We will not accept donations with strings.
